- @ Pickaway Correctional Institution (PCI)
- @ Southeastern Correctional Institution (SCI).

What is an Intensive Program Prison?

IPP originally started as Ohio's boot camp program under Ohio Revised Code 5120. It has been modified over time to include more programs and education in order to provide offenders tools needed for living a productive and crime free life and to prevent them from returning to the correctional system.

The "Second Chance to Change" initiative is the newest phase in the Department's development strategy for Intensive Program Prisons (IPP's). An inmate who successfully completes an IPP will have his/her sentence reduced to the amount of time already served and will be released on post-release supervision for an appropriate time period.

These intensive treatment programs offer inmates a genuine "Second Chance to Change" for two important reasons:

1. Programming is based on correctional programs that have been shown to be effective in reducing the likelihood of recidivism.
2. Each participating inmate is assessed to determine areas of need and is assigned to a program that matches his or her needs.

**This is just a summary of the eligibility requirements. Other factors pertaining to the offender may find him or her ineligible.*

Who's Eligible?

- ⓐ Non-violent offenders
- ⓐ All 3rd, 4th, or 5th degree felony offenders with a sentence of 5 years or less
- ⓐ No history of violent offense
- ⓐ Cannot be serving a mandatory sentence
- ⓐ No Sex offenders

If offenders meet the eligibility requirements, they will complete a 90 day program that is characterized by concentrated and rigorous specialized treatment services.

Types of IPP Programs:

- ⓐ Treatment of Alcohol and/or Drug Abuse
- ⓐ Treatment for Offenders Convicted of Drunk Driving
- ⓐ Program Emphasizing Academic and Vocational Education
- ⓐ Programming Emphasizing Community Service Work

How Can I Be Involved?

Upon entering the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction offenders are sent to one of three reception centers throughout the state. While there, they are evaluated and given a classification based on the crime they committed and other factors. During this time offenders with no more than 60 months on their sentence will be screened for eligibility to enter into an IPP program. Unless already specified in the sentencing journal, a notice is sent to the sentencing judge at least 3 weeks prior to transfer into the program. Judges are given 30 days from receipt to respond. If no objection is received by the Judge during that time frame, the offender enters the program.

If an offender is eligible, and you are registered with the Office of Victim Services, you will be notified. If accepted to the program, you will be notified upon completion of the program.
